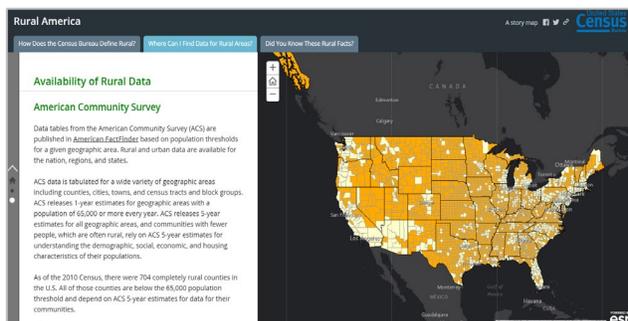

ACS offers a number of tools such as Narrative Profiles, a feature that generates custom, text-based reports that address 15 different topic areas (e.g., education, employment, poverty, disability, population, housing costs) and provides full-color graphics and charts to illustrate select social, economic, housing, and demographic estimates for the selected geographic area.

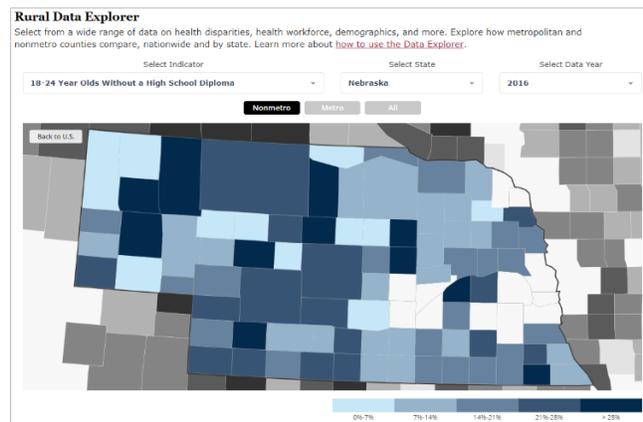

Developed by HAC, this interactive tool provides data on the social, economic, and housing characteristics of communities in the United States derived from various public use data sets, such as the 2010 Census of Population and Housing, the ACS, and the Home Mortgage Disclosure Act.

The USDA's Economic Research Service produces and maintains a number of data sets that are used by policymakers and researchers to identify, describe, and analyze data on rural and urban areas using measures of rurality such as the Rural-Urban Continuum Codes, which classify counties based on criteria like population size, adjacency to a metropolitan area, and commuting flows. This resource can be used to determine a community's rural status, degree of rurality, and eligibility for various federal programs and to describe a community's socioeconomic conditions with county-level data.

This report highlights trends in educational attainment among rural Americans and the relationship between educational attainment and economic prosperity for rural people and places. Educational attainment is growing in rural America. However, gains in educational attainment vary across demographic groups. Low education in rural areas is closely related to high poverty and unemployment rates.
